### Welcome to Indoor Worship at St. Barnabas'!

Welcome to our in-person indoor worship service. In order to worship safely we will:

- Have doors and windows open to provide fresh airflow,
- Be limited to those who have no COVID-19 symptoms and have not recently tested positive for COVID-19.
- Implement physical distancing so that individuals/families are at least six feet from each other,
- Require that a mask be worn at all times, except when a person has a lead speaking role at that point in the worship service,
- Prohibit touching, hugging, and handshakes,
- Permit singing while wearing masks,
- Please note that we do not require COVID vaccination to attend worship at St. Barnabas.

Distribution of bread and wine:

- Starting from the back of the room, Ushers will invite you forward to receive the bread and wine.
- After receiving the bread, you may slip it under your mask to consume it.
- Then you may take a small bowl of wine from the tray and consume the wine before returning to your seat. Empty bowls may be placed in the baskets along the side of the room.
- If you are unable to come forward, let the ushers know so the bread can be brought to you.

Two courtyard and two narthex bathrooms are available for your use. Please use the disinfecting spray that is in the bathroom. If you have any questions or concerns, the Ushers are available to assist you.

**Bidding (intercessory prayer) Book** – If you would like to add a prayer to be read during the church service, you should email the name of the person to our parish office at <u>saintbarnabas.ag@gmail.com</u>. Please send your prayer request by Noon on Wednesday otherwise your request will be added to the following week's service.





### THE COLLECT OF THE DAY

Celebrant	The Lord be with you.
People	And also with you.
Celebrant	Let us pray.

Almighty and everlasting God, you govern all things both in heaven and on earth: Mercifully hear the supplications of your people, and in our time grant us your peace; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. **Amen**.

The Collect for Purity is a prayer of preparation. We bring many things with us into worship, and we ask the Holy Spirit to help us set those distractions aside, even briefly, so that we may focus on our worship of God.

### The Collect of the Day is

a prayer that "collects" and organizes our thoughts. Like a sonnet or haiku, it follows a traditional structure – a preamble (address, invocation), a petition, and a conclusion (meditation). There is often an allusion to the Gospel reading. There is a Collect of the Day for each week of the year as well as special feast days.

### FIRST READING: Jeremiah 1:4-10


A Reading from the book of the prophet Jeremiah.

### SECOND READING: 1 Corinthians 13:1-13

A Reading from Paul's first letter to the Corinthians

Paul's love chapter, in his letter to the Corinthians. has little to say about love as a feeling. The love he describes is robust and dynamic think verbs, not adjectives. Love is not an emotion. It's not something we wait around for, or fall into. It is muscle, movement, sweat, action. Love acts patient ly and kindly. Love acts against the impulses of envy, irritation, and arrogance. Love yields, love rejoices, love refrains, love endures. In other words, love doesn't stand around waiting for warm fuzzies; love gets up and gets moving.


<sup>1</sup>If I speak in the tongues of mortals and of angels, but do not have love, I am a noisy gong or a clanging cymbal. <sup>2</sup>And if I have prophetic powers, and understand all mysteries and all knowledge, and if I have all faith, so as to remove mountains, but do not have love, I am nothing. <sup>3</sup>If I give away all my possessions, and if I hand over my body so that I may boast, but do not have love, I gain nothing.


<sup>4</sup>Love is patient; love is kind; love is not envious or boastful or arrogant <sup>5</sup>or rude. It does not insist on its own way; it is not irritable or resentful; <sup>6</sup>it does not rejoice in wrongdoing, but rejoices in the truth. <sup>7</sup>It bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things.

<sup>8</sup>Love never ends. But as for prophecies, they will come to an end; as for tongues, they will cease; as for knowledge, it will come to an end. <sup>9</sup>For we know only in part, and we prophesy only in part; <sup>10</sup>but when the complete comes, the partial will come to an end. <sup>11</sup>When I was a child, I spoke like a child, I thought like a child, I reasoned like a child; when I became an adult, I put an end to childish ways. <sup>12</sup>For now we see in a mirror, dimly, but then we will see face to face. Now I know only in part; then I will know fully, even as I have been fully known. <sup>13</sup>And now faith, hope, and love abide, these three; and the greatest of these is love.

And you will say, 'Do here also in your hometown the things that we have heard you did at Capernaum.'" <sup>24</sup>And he said, "Truly I tell you, no prophet is accepted in the prophet's hometown. <sup>25</sup>But the truth is, there were many widows in Israel in the time of Elijah, when the heaven was shut up three years and six months, and there was a severe famine over all the land; <sup>26</sup>yet Elijah was sent to none of them except to a widow at Zarephath in Sidon. <sup>27</sup>There were also many lepers in Israel in the time of the prophet Elisha, and none of them was cleansed except Naaman the Syrian." <sup>28</sup>When they heard this, all in the synagogue were filled with rage. <sup>29</sup>They got up, drove him out of the town, and led him to the brow of the hill on which their town was built, so that they might hurl him off the cliff. <sup>30</sup>But he passed through the midst of them and went on his way.

The Episcopal Church does not have a separate statement of faith or list of things we believe. Instead we hold the ancient **Creeds**, such as the Apostles' and Nicene, to be our statements of faith. They contain the core of our belief as Christians, but do not limit our faith.

of all that is, seen and unseen. We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father. Through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven: by the power of the Holy Spirit he became incarnate from the Virgin Mary, and was made man.

For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end. We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son. With the Father and the Son he is worshiped and glorified. He has spoken through the Prophets. We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.








### The Celebrant continues

We praise you and we bless you, holy and gracious God, source of life abundant. From before time you made ready the creation. Your Spirit moved over the deep and brought all things into being: sun, moon, and stars; earth, winds, and waters; and every living thing. You made us in your image, and taught us to walk in your ways. But we rebelled against you, and wandered far away; and yet, as a mother cares for her children, you would not forget us. Time and again you called us to live in the fullness of your love. Glory and honor and praise to you, holy and living God. To deliver us from the power of sin and death and to reveal the riches of your grace, you looked with favor upon Mary, your willing servant, that she might conceive and bear a son, Jesus the holy child of God. Living among us, Jesus loved us. He broke bread with outcasts and sinners, healed the sick, and proclaimed good news to the poor. He yearned to draw all the world to himself yet we were heedless of his call to walk in love. Then, the time came for him to complete upon the cross the sacrifice of his life, and to be glorified by you.

On the night before he died for us, Jesus was at table with his friends. He took bread, gave thanks to you, broke it, and gave it to them, and said: "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

As supper was ending, Jesus took the cup of wine. Again, he gave thanks to you, gave it to them, and said: "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is poured out for you and for all for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me." Now gathered at your table, O God of all creation, and remembering Christ, crucified and risen, who was and is and is to come, we offer to you our gifts of bread and wine, and ourselves, a living sacrifice.

Pour out your Spirit upon these gifts that they may be the Body and Blood of Christ. Breathe your Spirit over the whole earth and make us your new creation, the Body of Christ given for the world you have made.

In the fullness of time bring us, with Barnabas and all your saints, from every tribe and language and people and nation, to feast at the banquet prepared from the foundation of the world. Through Christ and with Christ and in Christ, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, to you be honor, glory, and praise, for ever and ever. **Amen**.



### Rachel Mann (nominated for a three-year term)

I became part of the St. Barnabas' community in 2018, after moving to the Central Coast from Minneapolis. Raised in an Evangelical Covenant church in a suburb of Chicago, my spiritual path has included Methodist, Episcopalian, and Lutheran communities. I've currently settled into a "Lutherpalian" identity.

It's good to be among others living into our baptismal vows to worship, to study, to serve others, and to work, in spite of our discomforts, to dismantle oppressive beliefs and systems.

For work, I'm a scientist turned lab equipment mechanic at a small chemistry research and manufacturing plant in San Luis Obispo. I enjoy fixing things there and around my home. I live in Grover Beach, entertained by my two kitties, Klaus and Khrome.

### Liza Navárro Zúñiga Nichols (nominated for a three-year term)

I was born and raised in Yanaguaga (Yana-wana), now known as San Antonio, Texas. I was raised Catholic, but my Maternal Grandmother also incorporated our ancestral ceremonies and medicines. My people are Tāp Pilam Coahuiltecan (kwa-weel-TEK-an), Guachichil (wah-CHEE-cheel), and Zacateco. My ancestral homelands span what is now South Texas and Northern Mexico, down to what is now known as the "Huasteca Potosina". I have a Bachelor of Arts in Music from the University of Texas at San Antonio, and have been a freelance mezzosoprano/church musician since 2004, mostly in the Episcopal Church. In 2013, during my time at All Saints' Episcopal Church in Austin, I was confirmed by Bishop Andy Doyle. In 2014, I moved to Massachusett Land, now known as Boston, and have been working in the Technology Resources Department at Berklee College of Music ever since. Berklee is also where I met my husband, Gabe - he is from the Chumash lands now known as Santa Maria, where we moved from Boston in June of 2020 to be closer to family. This is also how we found St. Barnabas, and met Fr. Rob - Our wedding plans had changed suddenly from taking place in Boston, and Fr. Rob counseled and married us. We enjoy spending time outside together, cooking, and taking road trips.

### Brian Petersen (nominated for a three-year term)

I have been a member of Saint Barnabas for the last 20 years after moving from Prince of Peace Episcopal Church in Woodland Hills, Ca. My wife and I live in Pismo Beach and have 3 grown children and 5 not so grown grandchildren. We own a company called Senior Living Consultants which, for the last 16 years, has helped families find placement for their loved ones in time of medical and/or mental erosion.

I have been the Treasurer here for over 17 years and during that time have also served on the Vestry two different times and have been the Junior Warden and Senior Warden. I have seen and experienced a lot of trials and tribulations in our church and have also seen growth and enrichment beyond my expectations. I am proud to be asked to serve and will to the best of my ability.

### Paul DeTilla (nominated for a one-year term)

As a baby boomer born in L.A., I was about two years old when my family moved into a new tract home in the southeastern portion of the county in what was formerly an orange grove. A few years later, the Moravian Church in America, a small, "historic," Christian denomination planted a church within a couple blocks of our home. That new church has had a tremendous impact on me personally and spiritually, and my family as well, for over 60 years. And it allowed me to gratefully participate in lay leadership roles at the local, regional and denominational levels.
