Welcome to Indoor Worship at St. Barnabas'!

Welcome to our in-person indoor worship service. In order to worship safely we will:

- Have doors and windows open to provide fresh airflow,
- Be limited to those who have no COVID-19 symptoms and have not recently tested positive for COVID-19.
- Require that a mask be worn at all times, except when a person has a lead speaking role at that point in the worship service,
- Prohibit touching, hugging, and handshakes,
- Permit singing while wearing masks,
- Please note that we do not require COVID vaccination to attend worship at St. Barnabas.

Distribution of bread:

- Starting from the back of the room, Ushers will invite you forward to receive the bread.
- After receiving the bread, you may slip it under your mask to consume it.
- If you are unable to come forward, let the ushers know so the bread can be brought to you.

Two courtyard and two narthex bathrooms are available for your use. Please use the disinfecting spray that is in the bathroom. If you have any questions or concerns, the Ushers are available to assist you.

PROCESSIONAL GOSPEL READING: Luke 19:28-40

²⁸After he had said this, he went on ahead, going up to Jerusalem.

²⁹When he had come near Bethphage and Bethany, at the place called the Mount of Olives, he sent two of the disciples, ³⁰saying, "Go into the village ahead of you, and as you enter it you will find tied there a colt that has never been ridden. Untie it and bring it here. ³¹If anyone asks you, 'Why are you untying it?' just say this, 'The Lord needs it.'" ³²So those who were sent departed and found it as he had told them. ³³As they were untying the colt, its owners asked them, "Why are you untying the colt?" ³⁴They said, "The Lord needs it." ³⁵Then they brought it to Jesus; and after throwing their cloaks on the colt, they set Jesus on it. ³⁶As he rode along, people kept spreading their cloaks on the road. ³⁷As he was now approaching the path down from the Mount of Olives, the whole multitude of the disciples began to praise God joyfully with a loud voice for all the deeds of power that they had seen, ³⁸saying,

BLESSING OF THE PALMS

The Celebrant then says the following blessing
Celebrant The Lord be with you.

People And also with you.

Celebrant Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.

People It is right to give him thanks and praise.

It is right to praise you, Almighty God, for the acts of love by which you have redeemed us through your Son Jesus Christ our Lord. On this day he entered the holy city of Jerusalem in triumph, and was proclaimed as King of kings by those who spread their garments and branches of palm along his way. Let these branches be for us signs of his victory, and grant that we who bear them in his name may ever hail him as our King, and follow him in the way that leads to eternal life; who lives and reigns in glory with you and the Holy Spirit, now and for ever. **Amen**.

Today we celebrate our annual observance of Palm Sunday, the start of Holy Week. The liturgical color is **red**, and we begin our worship with the Liturgy of the Palms and the triumphal entry of Jesus into Jerusalem. Though Jesus rejected being a king, that is what we celebrate today before descending into the later events of Holy Week which culminate in the death of Jesus on the Cross.

SECOND ANTHEM

The Cross leads the procession to the front doors of the church, followed by the clergy,

the Choral Scholars, and the people.

We will pause before entering for a prayer and then proceed into the worship space.

Those with large palms may place them on the floor in front of the altar.



Now that we have finished the Litany of the Palms, our worship continues with the same format and words that we use most Sundays of the year. The prayers and readings give us a preview of what is to come in the rest of Holy Week.

As you worship from home with our live streaming of the service you may decide to **stand and kneel** at the appropriate times. You can know that the others worshipping today are doing the same body movement as you are. What a way to do community!

Lord of all people and all nations, we lift before you the people of Ukraine and the people of Russia, each girl and boy, each woman and man living in fear of what tomorrow might bring. We long for a time you spoke of through your prophet Isaiah, when weapons of war would be beaten into ploughshares, when nation will no longer lift up sword against nation. We cry out to you for peace. Protect those who only desire and deserve to live in security and safety. Comfort those who fear for their lives and the lives of their loved ones. Change the hearts of those set on violence and aggression. Fill earthly leaders with great wisdom to find paths to peace. Please Lord come and have your way in your world. May your will be done here, on earth as it is in heaven. May your peace reign, now and always. (pause)

Were the whole realm of nature mine, that were a present far too small; love so amazing, so divine, demands my soul, my life, my all.



It is truly right to glorify you, Father, and to give you thanks; for you alone are God, living and true, dwelling in light inaccessible from before time and for ever.

During the season of Lent we are using **Eucharistic Prayer D** from the Episcopal Book of Common Prayer (1979). All Eucharistic Prayers follow a set format, though some have more contemporary and inclusive language. Eucharistic Prayer D is the most ancient of the ones we use. Fountain of life and source of all goodness, you made all things and fill them with your blessing; you created them to rejoice in the splendor of your radiance.

Countless throngs of angels stand before you to serve you night and day; and, beholding the glory of your presence, they offer you unceasing praise. Joining with them, and giving voice to every creature under heaven, we acclaim you, and glorify your Name, as we say,



The Celebrant continues

We acclaim you, holy Lord, glorious in power. Your mighty works reveal your wisdom and love. You formed us in your own image, giving the whole world into our care, so that, in obedience to you, our Creator, we might rule and serve all your creatures. When our disobedience took us far from you, you did not abandon us to the power of death. In your mercy you came to our help, so that in seeking you we might find you. Again and again you called us into covenant with you, and through the prophets you taught us to hope for salvation.

Father, you loved the world so much that in the fullness of time you sent your only Son to be our Savior. Incarnate by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary, he lived as one of us, yet without sin. To the poor he proclaimed the good news of salvation; to prisoners, freedom; to the sorrowful, joy. To fulfill your purpose he gave himself up to death; and, rising from the grave, destroyed death, and made the whole creation new.

And, that we might live no longer for ourselves, but for him who died and rose for us, he sent the Holy Spirit, his own first gift for those who believe, to complete his work in the world, and to bring to fulfillment the sanctification of all.

When the hour had come for him to be glorified by you, his heavenly Father, having loved his own who were in the world, he loved them to the end; at supper with them he took bread, and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you. This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Father, we now celebrate this memorial of our redemption. Recalling Christ's death and his descent among the dead, proclaiming his resurrection and ascension to your right hand, awaiting his coming in glory; and offering to you, from the gifts you have given us, this bread and this cup, we praise you and we bless you.

Celebrant and People

We praise you, we bless you, we give thanks to you, and we pray to you, Lord our God.

The Celebrant continues

Lord, we pray that in your goodness and mercy your Holy Spirit may descend upon us, and upon these gifts, sanctifying them and showing them to be holy gifts for your holy people, the bread of life and the cup of salvation, the Body and Blood of your Son Jesus Christ.

Grant that all who share this bread and cup may become one body and one spirit, a living sacrifice in Christ, to the praise of your Name.

Remember, Lord, your one holy catholic and apostolic Church, redeemed by the blood of your Christ. Reveal its unity, guard its faith, and preserve it in peace.

And grant that we may find our inheritance with the Blessed Virgin Mary, with patriarchs, prophets, apostles, and martyrs, with Barnabas and all the saints who have found favor with you in ages past. We praise you in union with them and give you glory through your Son Jesus Christ our Lord.

Through Christ, and with Christ, and in Christ, all honor and glory are yours, Almighty God and Father, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, for ever and ever. **Amen.**



Life at St. Barnabas

From the Vestry –In its last meeting, our Vestry decided several things that we want to bring to your attention.

Changes in Covid safety and hygiene policies - Beginning today, we are shifting our St. Barnabas mask policy to highly recommend the wearing of masks in worship, but if you are fully vaccinated it is no longer mandatory to wear a mask. This change is consistent with the shift in guidance from our Bishop. This Sunday we will beginning having the ushers pass the offering plate, and we will move our 11:15 Coffee Hour into the Parish Hall. Finally, kids and teachers will no longer be required to wear masks in the classroom, though it is still highly recommended. This last update is consistent with the policies of our local school district, Lucia Mar. All of this is subject to change if the case count takes off again. Please let us know if you have any questions or concerns.

Restart of our parish Investment Committee - With the recent rise in interest rates we are restarting our Investment Committee. We have approximately \$700k in funds dedicated to the purchase of a new St. Barnabas Thrift Shop building, and about another \$270k in money in our Patricia Somes fund for the support of ministries with children, youth, and families. In addition, we have about \$100k in other designated funds, and another \$100k in Vestry reserves. The Vestry has asked Jim Kilponen, Bob Taylor, and Michele Davenport to join the committee. Our Rector and Treasurer are also members of the Investment Committee. Together they will make a recommendation to the Vestry in April about the best investment of these designated funds and reserves. Please let us know if you have any questions.

Additional fund raising - We try to keep additional fund raising efforts to a minimum, but the Vestry has approved three special fund raising campaigns at St. Barnabas - first, for the local resettlement of Afghani refugees through SLO4Home, second, for the aide of Ukrainian refugees through Episcopal Relief and Development (ERD), and finally, a Palm Sunday offering for the Episcopal Diocese of Jerusalem. Please see details in the bulletin and weekly-e for each of these.

<u>SLO4Home</u> – You can be a lifeline for refugee families in need. In the coming months and years, more than 65,000 Afghans will be welcomed in communities across the United States. These families have urgent and varied needs, many having left vibrant lives with only what they could carry. We are working to ensure San Luis Obispo will be a welcoming and supportive new home for the families who will arrive in the months ahead. We cannot do this without your help.

<u>Donate to help Ukraine</u> – As the invasion and violence continue to increase in Ukraine, and refugees flee into neighboring countries, some have asked what we can do to help with this crisis. We have learned today that over 3 million people are currently displaced because of the war, and organizations are working together to provide basics of food, clothing, and shelter.
