

Welcome to Indoor Worship at St. Barnabas'!

Welcome to our in-person indoor worship service. In order to worship safely we will:

- Have doors and windows open to provide fresh airflow,
- Be limited to those who have no COVID-19 symptoms and have not recently tested positive for COVID-19.
- Require that a mask be worn at all times, except when a person has a lead speaking role at that point in the worship service,
- Prohibit touching, hugging, and handshakes,
- Permit singing while wearing masks,
- Please note that we do not require COVID vaccination to attend worship at St. Barnabas.

Distribution of bread and wine:

- Starting from the back of the room, Ushers will invite you forward to receive the bread and wine.
- After receiving the bread, you may slip it under your mask to consume it.
- Then you may take a small bowl of wine from the tray and consume the wine before returning to your seat. Empty bowls may be placed in the baskets along the side of the room.
- If you are unable to come forward, let the ushers know so the bread can be brought to you.

Two courtyard and two narthex bathrooms are available for your use. Please use the disinfecting spray that is in the bathroom. If you have any questions or concerns, the Ushers are available to assist you.

Bidding (intercessory prayer) Book – If you would like to add a prayer to be read during the church service, you may add it to the "Bidding Book" located at the back of the church to the left of the doors. If you cannot join us in person and would like to add a prayer to be read during the church service you can email the name of the person to our parish office at saintbarnabas.ag@gmail.com (before Thursday morning), or add it to the comments section on Facebook Live during the livestream.





Celebrant Alleluia. Christ is risen.

People The Lord is risen indeed. Alleluia.

There are seven weeks in the season of Easter and it is appropriate to say "Happy Easter" during the entire season. The color for the season is white, and we conclude the season with Pentecost on Sunday, June 5th.

This prayer is called the Collect for Purity, and it is reminiscent of Psalm 51. As its name implies, this is the state in which we hope to approach God in worship. The prayer dates back to the 11th century, which means it would have originally been in Latin. In this season, as a sign of welcome, the Celebrant is saying this prayer in Spanish.

The Collect of the Day is a prayer that "collects" and organizes our thoughts. Like a sonnet or haiku, it follows a traditional structure a preamble (address, invocation), a petition, and a conclusion (meditation). There is

often an allusion to the Gospel reading. There is a Collect of the Day for each week of the year as well as special

feast days.

FIRST READING: Acts 5:27-32


A Reading from the Acts of the Apostles.

²⁷When the temple police had brought the apostles, they had them stand before the council. The high priest questioned them, ²⁸saying, "We gave you strict orders not to teach in this name, yet here you have filled Jerusalem with your teaching and you are determined to bring this man's blood on us." ²⁹But Peter and the apostles answered, "We must obey God rather than any human authority. ³⁰The God of our ancestors raised up Jesus, whom you had killed by hanging him on a tree. ³¹God exalted him at his right hand as Leader and Savior that he might give repentance to Israel and forgiveness of sins. ³²And we are witnesses to these things, and so is the Holy Spirit whom God has given to those who obey him."

Reader The Word of the Lord. **People** Thanks be to God.

PSALM: 150

Cantor introduces Refrain. All repeat. Choral Scholars sing verses. Remain seated.



¹Praise the LORD!

Praise God in his sanctuary; praise him in his mighty firmament! ²Praise him for his mighty deeds;

praise him according to his surpassing greatness! *Refrain*

³Praise him with trumpet sound; praise him with lute and harp! ⁴Praise him with tambourine and dance; praise him with strings and pipe! *Refrain*

⁵Praise him with clanging cymbals; praise him with loud clashing cymbals! ⁶Let everything that breathes praise the LORD! Praise the LORD! *Refrain* This **psalm** is the final one in the series. It is another psalm of praise. Each verse is slightly longer than the previous one, indicating increasing praise.

SECOND READING: Revelation 1:4-8

A Reading from the Revelation of John.

⁴John to the seven churches that are in Asia:

Grace to you and peace from him who is and who was and who is to come, and from the seven spirits who are before his throne, ⁵ and from Jesus Christ, the faithful witness, the firstborn of the dead, and the ruler of the kings of the earth.

To him who loves us and freed us from our sins by his blood, ⁶and made us to be a kingdom, priests serving his God and Father, to him be glory and dominion forever and ever. Amen.

even those who pierced him;


and on his account all the tribes of the earth will wail.

Ralph Vaughan Williams is one of the best-known British composers. Our 1982 Hymnal includes 27 hvmns written or arranged by him. Today in our worship we feature three of his hymns including our Entrance, Sequence, and Communion hymns as well as the Prelude. Today at 3pm, the San Luis Obispo Master Chorale (along with several from St. Barnabas) is performing three Vaughan Williams choral pieces including "Fantasia on the Old 104th Psalm Tune," "Five Mystical Songs," and "Dona nobis pachem."



GOSPEL: John 20: 19-31

Deacon The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John.

People Glory to you, Lord Christ.

¹⁹When it was evening on that day, the first day of the week, and the doors of the house where the disciples had met were locked for fear of the Jews, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you." ²⁰After he said this, he showed them his hands and his side. Then the disciples rejoiced when they saw the Lord. ²¹Jesus said to them again, "Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you." ²²When he had said this, he breathed on them and said to them, "Receive the Holy Spirit. ²³If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven them; if you retain the sins of any, they are retained."

²⁴But Thomas (who was called the Twin), one of the twelve, was not with them when Jesus came. ²⁵So the other disciples told him, "We have seen the Lord." But he said to them, "Unless I see the mark of the nails in his hands, and put my finger in the mark of the nails and my hand in his side, I will not believe."

²⁶A week later his disciples were again in the house, and Thomas was with them. Although the doors were shut, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you." ²⁷Then he said to Thomas, "Put your finger here and see my hands. Reach out your hand and put it in my side. Do not doubt but believe." ²⁸Thomas answered him, "My Lord and my God!" ²⁹Jesus said to him, "Have you believed because you have seen me? Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have come to believe."

³⁰Now Jesus did many other signs in the presence of his disciples, which are not written in this book. ³¹But these are written so that you may come to believe that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God, and that through believing you may have life in his name.

THE SERMON

It is traditional for the Gospel reading to be proclaimed from the midst of the people. Thus, the Deacon and book holder process to the middle of the center aisle with the Gospel Book, and the people all turn toward the reader.

As the Gospel is announced, some people use their thumb to make the sign of the cross on their forehead, mouth, and heart. These three locations indicate that the Gospel reading is to enter the mind, voice, and heart.

THE NICENE CREED

All stand.

The Episcopal Church
does not have a
separate statement of
faith or list of things
we believe. Instead we
hold the ancient
Creeds, such as the
Apostles' and Nicene,
to be our statements
of faith. They contain
the core of our belief
as Christians, but do
not limit our faith.

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father. Through him all things were made.

For us and for our salvation

he came down from heaven:

by the power of the Holy Spirit

he became incarnate from the Virgin Mary, and was made man.

For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate;

he suffered death and was buried.

On the third day he rose again

in accordance with the Scriptures;

he ascended into heaven

and is seated at the right hand of the Father.

He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life,

who proceeds from the Father and the Son.

With the Father and the Son he is worshiped and glorified.

He has spoken through the Prophets.

We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church.

We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins.

We look for the resurrection of the dead,

and the life of the world to come. Amen.

The Deacon adds a concluding Collect.

If you are on Facebook Live please put any prayer requests into the comment section of Facebook Live.

If you are in person then you may write pray requests into the Bidding Book on the shelf at the back of the worship space.

Words and names in **bold** are said together.

Normally at this point in our worship we recite our communal **Confession** and receive absolution. However, in the season of Easter we do not say the Confession. This is a reminder that the resurrection of Jesus "saves" us from those things that separate us from God and one another. After the Easter season ends on Pentecost we will go back to reciting the Confession.

If online, then type "Peace" or another appropriate phrase into the comment section of Facebook Live.

In addition, if you have a birthday, anniversary or other celebration please type that into the comments.

In rock where time had carved a cave, the Savior slept, his body torn-And underfoot lay stone and dust, and overhead a broken thorn.


From rock where time had carved a cave, the Savior rose on Easter morn-And underfoot, a field of wheat, and overhead, a flowering thorn!

DOXOLOGY

The people stand and sing.



This hymn was written after the fashion of a medieval carol which often borrows a symbolic image from nature—in this case, the thorn tree—and weaves it into a repetitive text. The "stone" evokes stone hearts, sealed like a tomb, into which Christ enters and from which he frees us. The "dust" evokes our mortality: from dust we came. to dust we will return—but the grains of dust are transformed into wheat. The thorn tree evokes the suffering of Christ which makes this transformation possible and finally bursts into flower, its beauty revealed, at his resurrection.

During the seasons of
Easter we are using
Eucharistic Prayer A
from the Episcopal
1979 Book of Common
Prayer. All Eucharistic
Prayers follow a set
format, though some
have more
contemporary and
inclusive language.

This anthem is known as the **Sanctus**. It is said or sung in almost every version of the Eucharistic Prayer. The word "sanctus" is Latin for "holy." God is holy and worthy of respect, awe, reverence, and devotion.


The Celebrant continues

It is right, and a good and joyful thing, always and everywhere to give thanks to you, Almighty God, Creator of heaven and earth.

But chiefly are we bound to praise you for the glorious resurrection of your Son Jesus Christ our Lord; for he is the true Paschal Lamb, who was sacrificed for us, and has taken away the sin of the world. By his death he has destroyed death, and by his rising to life again he has won for us everlasting life.

Therefore we praise you, joining our voices with Angels and Archangels and with all the company of heaven, who for ever sing this hymn to proclaim the glory of your Name:

The Celebrant and People sing together



Holy and gracious Father: In your infinite love you made us for yourself; and, when we had fallen into sin and become subject to evil and death, you, in your mercy, sent Jesus Christ, your only and eternal Son, to share our human nature, to live and die as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the God and Father of all.

He stretched out his arms upon the cross, and offered himself in obedience to your will, a perfect sacrifice for the whole world.

On the night he was handed over to suffering and death, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Therefore we proclaim the mystery of faith:

Celebrant and People

Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again.

We celebrate the memorial of our redemption, O Father, in this sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving. Recalling his death, resurrection, and ascension, we offer you these gifts. Sanctify them by your Holy Spirit to be for your people the Body and Blood of your Son, the holy food and drink of new and unending life in him. + Sanctify us also that we may faithfully receive this holy Sacrament, and serve you in unity, constancy, and peace; and at the last day bring us with all your saints into the joy of your eternal kingdom. All this we ask through your Son Jesus Christ. By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty Father, now and for ever.. Amen.



At these words some make the sign of the cross as symbol of our sanctification and blessing by the food drink, and by extension the acts of Jesus.


The Breaking of the Bread

Adult Ed series on Pilgrimage – Join us for a light supper followed by learning and discussion on the topic of "Pilgrimage." A pilgrimage is a journey, often into an unknown or foreign place, where a person goes in search of new or expanded meaning about their self, others, nature, or a higher good, through the experience. It can lead to a personal transformation, after which the pilgrim returns to their daily life. Curiously, some pilgrimages never leave home. Join us at the church starting on <u>Thursday, May 12th at 6:30 pm</u> for this three week series. These classes will not be online.

The Spirituality of Aging – In this series of classes we will look at how to "grow" old, rather than just "get" old, by exploring the wisdom of a lifetime and embracing the changes that aging brings. Age has a different task than youth, or mature adulthood. The task is to reflect on the meaning of life and to prepare for the final surrender of all we are and have been to our Creator and Guide. We move from "doing" to "being", and from "role" to "soul". Age may bring not only the challenge of losses and change but also present moment appreciation of all God has made and done in us. We may miss our ability to control the outcomes of our health, life, relationships, but we are invited to a new vision of God as our faithful companion. We can learn to find God everywhere, not just in special places, rituals or times. And little by little the trust this builds in us opens into a joyous, grateful experience of the Present Moment which will become an Eternity of Love. This four week series will begin on Tuesday, May 10th at 3:00 pm. This class will be held in the Parish Hall/Forum Room and will not be online.


