Welcome to Indoor Worship at St. Barnabas'!

Welcome to our in-person indoor worship service. In order to worship safely we will:

- Have doors and windows open to provide fresh airflow,
- Be limited to those who have no COVID symptoms and have not recently tested positive for COVID.
- Recommend that a mask be worn at all times, however, masks are optional for those who have been vaccinated and are healthy,
- Prohibit touching, hugging, and handshakes,
- Please note that we do not require COVID vaccination to attend worship at St. Barnabas.

Distribution of bread: In this season we are only serving bread (and not the wine). There are many beautiful ways to participate in the Eucharist, one is to serve bread only. This is something that we got used to doing during Covid, and going back to bread only reminds us that there is more than one way to do most things in worship.

- Starting from the back of the room, Ushers will invite you forward to receive the bread.
- Proceed up to the rail around the altar where you may stand or kneel to receive the bread.
- After receiving the bread, you may slip it under your mask to consume it.
- If you are unable to come forward, let the ushers know so the bread can be brought to you.

Four courtyard and two narthex bathrooms are available for your use. Please use the disinfecting spray that is in the bathroom. If you have any questions or concerns, the Ushers are available to assist you.






well-known of the Advent hymns. In this carol we ask Jesus to come into the world and change both the universe and us. "Emmanuel" is Hebrew for "God is with us." It is a name that we first see in the Old Testament book of the prophet Isaiah, a name of one who will protect the house and lineage of King David. The New Testament Gospel of Matthew interprets this same name, Emmanuel, as a foretellina of the birth of the Messiah and the fulfillment of Scripture in the person of Jesus.

The color for the Season of Advent is purple or blue. As a way to mark this season of expectation and hope, we wear blue vestments at St. Barnabas. This is a recovery of an ancient **English tradition** stemming from Salisbury Cathedral, so the particular blue that is worn is referred to as "saram blue" (Sarum being the ancient Latin name for Salisbury.)

Kyrie Eleison is Greek for "Lord, have mercy." Like this version of the Opening Anthem, a Kyrie is often sung as a call and response. During this Season of Advent, we observe a moment of silence at this point of our worship.





This style of chant is called "simplified Anglican Chant." When singing a text in Anglican Chant, the natural rhythm of the words as they would be spoken governs how the music is fitted to the words.

The bold words at the end of the line indicate when the next note of a measure should be sung. Note that this note change is sometimes done for only the last part of a word.


SECOND READING: Romans 1:1-7

THE SERMON

Followed by a moment of silent mediation.

It is traditional for the people to stand as the **Gospel Book** is lifted high by the Deacon.

As the Gospel is announced, some people use their thumb to make the sign of the cross on their forehead, mouth, and heart. These three locations indicate that the Gospel reading is to enter the mind, voice, and heart. Some people also bow as a sign of reverence for Jesus who is depicted in the Gospels.

It is customary for us to say the **Nicene Creed** any time we have a Eucharist. The Creed is structured in the threefold way of the Trinity – Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.

THE NICENE CREED

All stand.

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen. We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ,

the only Son of God,
eternally begotten of the Father,
God from God, Light from Light,
true God from true God,
begotten, not made,
of one Being with the Father.
Through him all things were made.

For us and for our salvation

he came down from heaven:

by the power of the Holy Spirit

he became incarnate from the Virgin Mary, and was made man.

For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate;

he suffered death and was buried.

On the third day he rose again

in accordance with the Scriptures;

he ascended into heaven

and is seated at the right hand of the Father.

He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life,

who proceeds from the Father and the Son.

With the Father and the Son he is worshiped and glorified.

He has spoken through the Prophets.

We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church.

We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins.

We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.

have mercy on us and forgive us;
that we may delight in your will,
and walk in your ways,
to the glory of your Name. Amen.

Prayer requests written in the bidding book (located on the shelf at the back of the worship space) and names put into the Comment Section of Facebook Live will be included in the bulletin next week.

In response to the Confession the Priest says the Absolution signifying the grace that we have already received through Jesus. As the Absolution is said some choose to make the sign of the Cross by using the fingers to touch the forehead, heart, left shoulder and right shoulder, and back to the heart again.

The Priest stands and says






The Celebrant continues

The Celebrant continues

We give thanks to you, O God, for the goodness and love which you have made known to us in creation; in the calling of Israel to be your people; in your Word spoken through the prophets; and above all in the Word made flesh, Jesus, your Son. For in these last days you sent him to be incarnate from the Virgin Mary, to be the Savior and Redeemer of the world. In him, you have delivered us from evil, and made us worthy to stand before you. In him, you have brought us out of error into truth, out of sin into righteousness, out of death into life.

In the fullness of time, put all things in subjection under your Christ, and bring us to that heavenly country where, with Barnabas and all your saints, we may enter the everlasting heritage of your sons and daughters; through Jesus Christ our Lord, the firstborn of all creation, the head of the Church, and the author of our salvation.




