

# Welcome to Indoor Worship at St. Barnabas'!

Welcome to our in-person indoor worship service. In order to worship safely we will:

- Have doors and windows open to provide fresh airflow,
- Be limited to those who have no COVID-19 symptoms and have not recently tested positive for COVID.
- Recommend that a mask be worn at all times, however, masks are optional for those who have been vaccinated and are healthy,
- Please note that we do not require COVID vaccination to attend worship at St. Barnabas.

#### Distribution of bread and wine:

- Starting from the balcony and then the back of the room, Ushers will invite you forward to receive the bread and wine.
- Then you may take a small bowl of wine from the tray and consume the wine before returning to your seat. Empty bowls may be placed in the baskets along the side of the room.
- If you prefer, instead of an individual bowl, you may drink wine from the common chalice.
- If you are unable to come forward, let the ushers know so the bread can be brought to you.

Four courtyard and two narthex bathrooms are available for your use. Please use the disinfecting spray that is in the bathroom. If you have any questions or concerns, the Ushers are available to assist you.

banquets of love's surprise.


Love is strong as death—


#### **COLLECT FOR PURITY**

# FIRST READING: Acts 1:15-17, 21-26


A reading from the Acts of the Apostles.

In those days Peter stood up among the believers (together the crowd numbered about one hundred twenty persons) and said, "Friends, the scripture had to be fulfilled, which the Holy Spirit through David foretold concerning Judas, who became a guide for those who arrested Jesus-- for he was numbered among us and was allotted his share in this ministry. So one of the men who have accompanied us during all the time that the Lord Jesus went in and out among us, beginning from the baptism of John until the day when he was taken up from usone of these must become a witness with us to his resurrection."

In this Season of Easter our First Reading is from the New Testament Book of Acts which shows the work of the early church in the first century. In the first several chapters of the Book of Acts we read about the work of the Apostle Peter to spread the good news about Jesus.

So they proposed two, Joseph called Barsabbas, who was also known as Justus, and Matthias. Then they prayed and said, "Lord, you know everyone's heart. Show us which one of these two you have chosen to take the place in this ministry and apostleship from which Judas turned aside to go to his own place." And they cast lots for them, and the lot fell on Matthias; and he was added to the eleven apostles.

# SECOND READING: 1 John 5:9-13

A reading from the first letter of John.

If we receive human testimony, the testimony of God is greater; for this is the testimony of God that he has testified to his Son. Those who believe in the Son of God have the testimony in their hearts. Those who do not believe in God have made him a liar by not believing in the testimony that God has given concerning his Son. And this is the testimony: God gave us eternal life, and this life is in his Son. Whoever has the Son has life; whoever does not have the Son of God does not have life.

I write these things to you who believe in the name of the Son of God, so that you may know that you have eternal life.

Scholars think that the letters from John were written in about 100 A.D. by one or more teachers who were heirs to the teachings of John the Evangelist. This text helps us live into a life that is centered on Jesus and God.



This hymn is from a Dakota Indian chant. Based on Jeremiah 10, it is a text born out of the faith the Dakota people during great tribulation. With great solemnity it acknowledges God's work of creation and the desire for God's presence. Last week, this was our opening hymn.



It is traditional for the people to stand as the **Gospel Book** is lifted high by the Deacon.

As the Gospel is announced, some people use their thumb to make the sign of the cross on their forehead, mouth, and heart. These three locations indicate that the Gospel reading is to enter the mind, voice, and heart. Some people also bow as a sign of reverence for Jesus who is depicted in the Gospels.

GOSPEL: John 17:6-19

All stand.

Deacon The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John.People Glory to you, Lord Christ.

Jesus prayed for his disciples, "I have made your name known to those whom you gave me from the world. They were yours, and you gave them to me, and they have kept your word. Now they know that everything you have given me is from you; for the words that you gave to me I have given to them, and they have received them and know in truth that I came from you; and they have believed that you sent me. I am asking on their behalf; I am not asking on behalf of the world, but on behalf of those whom you gave me, because they are yours. All mine are yours, and yours are mine; and I have been glorified in them. And now I am no longer in the world, but they are in the world, and I am coming to you. Holy Father, protect them in your name that you have given me, so that they may be one, as we are one. While I was with them, I protected them in your name that you have given me. I guarded them, and not one of them was lost except the one destined to be lost, so that the scripture might be fulfilled. But now I am coming to you, and I speak these things in the world so that they may have my joy made complete in themselves. I have given them your word, and the world has hated them because they do not belong to the world, just as I do not belong to the world. I am not asking you to take them out of the world, but I ask you to protect them from the evil one. They do not belong to the world, just as I do not belong to the world. Sanctify them in the truth; your word is truth. As you have sent me into the world, so I have sent them into the world. And for their sakes I sanctify myself, so that they also may be sanctified in truth."

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life,

who proceeds from the Father and the Son.

With the Father and the Son he is worshiped and glorified.

He has spoken through the Prophets.

We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church.

We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins.

We look for the resurrection of the dead,

It is customary for us to say the **Nicene Creed** any time we have a Eucharist. The Creed is structured in the threefold way of the Trinity – Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.

In this Easter Season our Prayers of the People are Form 3 from the Episcopal Book of Common Prayer.

You may write prayer requests into the Bidding Book on the shelf at the back of the worship space.

Words and names in **bold** are said together.





# THE GREAT THANKSGIVING

The People remain standing.



#### The Celebrant continues

It is right, and a good and joyful thing, always and everywhere to give thanks to you, Almighty God, Creator of heaven and earth.

But chiefly are we bound to praise you for the glorious resurrection of your Son Jesus Christ our Lord; for he is the true Paschal Lamb, who was sacrificed for us, and has taken away the sin of the world. By his death he has destroyed death, and by his rising to life again he has won for us everlasting life.

Therefore we praise you, joining our voices with Angels and Archangels and with all the company of heaven, who for ever sing this hymn to proclaim the glory of your Name:



This anthem is known as the **Sanctus**. It is said or sung in almost every version of the Eucharistic Prayer. The word "sanctus" is Latin for "holy." God is holy and worthy of respect, awe, reverence, and devotion.

We give thanks to you, O God, for the goodness and love which you have made known to us in creation; in the calling of Israel to be your people; in your Word spoken through the prophets; and above all in the Word made flesh, Jesus, your Son. For in these last days you sent him to be incarnate from the Virgin Mary, to be the Savior and Redeemer of the world. In him, you have delivered us from evil, and made us worthy to stand before you. In him, you have brought us out of error into truth, out of sin into righteousness, out of death into life.

On the night before he died for us, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me." Therefore, according to his command, O Father,

We remember his death, We proclaim his resurrection, We await his coming in glory.

#### The Celebrant continues

And we offer our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving to you, O Lord of all; presenting to you, from your creation, this bread and this wine.

We pray you, gracious God, to send your Holy Spirit upon these gifts that they may be the Sacrament of the Body of Christ and his Blood of the new Covenant. Unite us to your Son in his sacrifice, that we may be acceptable through him, being sanctified by the Holy Spirit.

In the fullness of time, put all things in subjection under your Christ, and bring us to that heavenly country where, with Barnabas and all your saints, we may enter the everlasting heritage of your sons and daughters; through Jesus Christ our Lord, the firstborn of all creation, the head of the Church, and the author of our salvation.

By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty Father, now and for ever. **Amen**.

This point of the Eucharistic Prayer is known as the **Epiclesus**. It is the invocation or calling down from on high by which the Priest invokes the Holy Spirit on the Eucharistic bread and wine. + "Sanctify us also..." At these words some make the **sign of the cross** as symbol of our sanctification and blessing by the food

drink, and by extension the acts of Jesus.




# THE BREAKING OF THE BREAD

# LIFE AT ST. BARNABAS

<u>FOR NAVAJOLAND</u> – Each year, Bishop Lucinda has charged the deacons in our diocese to create an outreach project for our diocesan Spring Renewal weekend. This year we are planning to help fund a community that is near to our Bishop's heart--The Episcopal Mission Area of Navajoland. Specifically, our Spring Renewal project is to help send delegates from their Mission to General Convention in June, as well as other needs they may have. To this end we are asking each parish to:

- 1) Add Navajoland to the Sunday Prayers of the People for the month of May.
- 2) With Bishop Lucinda's permission, we are asking each parish to <u>donate</u> at least some if not all of the <u>plate</u> <u>contributions received on Sunday May 5th</u>.

This is so that all persons in the diocese can participate even if they are not coming to Spring Renewal in Salinas. Our St. Barnabas Vestry has decided to participate and send all Plate offerings on May 5<sup>th</sup> to the diocese for Navajoland. If you did not have an opportunity to donate last Sunday you can still write a check with Navajoland in the memo line or put cash in an envelope and label it Navajoland.

<u>THE LIFE AND WRITINGS OF DIETRICH BONHOEFFER</u> – The diocesan Social Justice Committee is offering a four-week online course. Bonhoeffer was a German Lutheran pastor, Theologian and Professor known for his staunch resistance to the Nazi dictatorship, including vocal opposition to genocidal persecution of the Jews.

This four-week on-line discussion will explore the major themes of his writing and speaking and how he not only helped transform an entire faith community in Germany during World War II, but how his beliefs continue to impact the Christian faith of people throughout the world today. It will challenge us to re-examine some of our own ideas in the light of his clarity of thought.

Each week a 20-minute video will introduce a discussion of the church and our calling as Christians to respond to the challenges of our time. The four sessions are titled:

- 1. What is the Church?
- 2. Living in Christian Community
- 3. Religion-less Christianity
- 4. Come and Die

This conversation is offered by the diocesan Social Justice Committee on <u>Tuesdays at 7:00 pm</u> during May; starting May 7<sup>th</sup> and continuing this week on May 14<sup>th</sup>. Please register in advance at this link: <u>bit.ly/bonhoeffercourse</u>

<u>MEN'S MINISTRY IN THE 21<sup>ST</sup> CENTURY</u> – Province VII of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew is having a retreat at Barnabas's on <u>Saturday 1 June, from 10:00 am to 4:00 pm</u>. The retreat will combine prayer and study. We will explore: What is men's ministry in a non-binary world? There will be ample time for prayer, reflection, and the exchange of ideas. There will also be time for socializing. Both men and women are cordially invited to attend.
