

Welcome to Worship at St. Barnabas'!

All are welcome to receive communion. If you are not baptized the Spirit may be calling you to communion and baptism. Baptism is our YES to the love God enfolds us in and our pledge to live that love. We'll accompany you on a journey towards baptism (which is actually the first part of the communion service). In the meantime you are always welcome at God's table. We are glad you are here.

Distribution of bread and wine:

- The musicians are served first so they can lead us in our Communion Hymns.
- Then, starting from the balcony and then the back of the room, Ushers will invite you forward to receive the bread and wine.
- You may either stand or kneel at the rail to receive the bread. You may also cross your arms for a blessing instead of receiving the bread.
- If you prefer to drink from a common chalice then stay at the rail to do so.
- If you prefer to drink from an individual small bowl, then those are served on the main floor. Empty bowls may be placed in the baskets along the side of the room.
- If you are unable to come forward, let the ushers know so the bread can be brought to you.

Four courtyard and two narthex bathrooms are available for your use. If you have any questions or concerns, the Ushers are available to assist you.

THE WORD OF GOD

Stand as you are able.

Each year we observe a cycle of seasons. The year starts with Advent which leads into the seasons of Christmas, Epiphany, Lent, Easter, and Pentecost. We are currently in the long season after Pentecost called "ordinary time." The color for this season is green.

This year we have layered in a special season about Creation and our need to care for Creation. Note the various prayers and sayings in our worship that focus on Creation.

In addition, today we are celebrating the **Feast of St. Francis** an 11th century monk and mystic who is often associated with the care of creation.

And, today after the Eucharist, we will be doing our annual **blessing of pets and animals**. You are welcomed to have your well-behaved pet in worship with you. Alternatively, you may also go bring your pet into worship after you receive the Eucharistic bread and wine.

This **Profession of Creation** is provided by

the Anglican Communion's "Seasons of Creation" steering committee, and we will use it during our own **Season of Creation** which we are observing until the Feast of St. Francis on October 6th.

In this special Season of Creation our Song of Praise is "A Song of Judith." This song or canticle is taken from a hymn of praise and thanksgiving to God that is found in the Book of Judith. We include this book in the Apocrypha, that section in the Bible that is between the Old Testament and the New Testament. The Book of Judith is a wellcrafted work of fiction, an example of the ancient Jewish novel in the Greco-Roman period.

THE LESSONS

The people sit.

FIRST READING: Job 1:1; 2:1-10

A reading from the Book of Job.

There was once a man in the land of Uz whose name was Job. That man was blameless and upright, one who feared God and turned away from evil.

One day the heavenly beings came to present themselves before the Lord, and Satan also came among them to present himself before the Lord. The Lord said to Satan, "Where have you come from?" Satan answered the Lord, "From going to and fro on the earth, and from walking up and down on it." The Lord said to Satan, "Have you considered my servant Job? There is no one like him on the earth, a blameless and upright man who fears God and turns away from evil. He still persists in his integrity, although you incited me against him, to destroy him for no reason." Then Satan answered the Lord, "Skin for skin! All that people have they will give to save their lives. But stretch out your hand now and touch his bone and his flesh, and he will curse you to your face." The Lord said to Satan, "Very well, he is in your power; only spare his life."

So Satan went out from the presence of the Lord, and inflicted loathsome sores on Job from the sole of his foot to the crown of his head. Job took a potsherd with which to scrape himself, and sat among the ashes.

Then his wife said to him, "Do you still persist in your integrity? Curse God, and die." But he said to her, "You speak as any foolish woman would speak. Shall we receive the good at the hand of God, and not receive the bad?" In all this Job did not sin with his lips.

SECOND READING: Hebrews 1:1-4; 2:5-12

A reading from the letter to the Hebrews.

Long ago God spoke to our ancestors in many and various ways by the prophets, but in these last days he has spoken to us by a Son, whom he appointed heir of all things, through whom he also created the worlds. He is the reflection of God's glory and the exact imprint of God's very being, and he sustains all things by his powerful word. When he had made purification for sins, he sat down at the right hand of the Majesty on high, having become as much superior to angels as the name he has inherited is more excellent than theirs. Now God did not subject the coming world, about which we are speaking, to angels. But someone has testified somewhere,

"What are human beings that you are mindful of them,

or mortals, that you care for them?

You have made them for a little while lower than the angels;

you have crowned them with glory and honor,

subjecting all things under their feet."

Now in subjecting all things to them, God left nothing outside their control. As it is, we do not yet see everything in subjection to them, but we do see Jesus, who for a little while was made lower than the angels, now crowned with glory and honor because of the suffering of death, so that by the grace of God he might taste death for everyone.

It was fitting that God, for whom and through whom all things exist, in bringing many children to glory, should make the pioneer of their salvation perfect through sufferings. For the one who sanctifies and those who are sanctified all have one Father. For this reason Jesus is not ashamed to call them brothers and sisters, saying,

"I will proclaim your name to my brothers and sisters, in the midst of the congregation I will praise you."

This is a **psalm** of trust. It is a dialogue between a pilgrim to Jerusalem and a responding priest.

Both before and after the proclamation of the Gospel reading, we sing a Sequence Hymn. A "sequence" is a chant or hymn sung or recited during the liturgical celebration of the Eucharist. The placement of the music provides special emphasis to good news of the Gospels as they describe the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus.



GOSPEL: Mark 10:2-16

All stand.

DeaconThe Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Mark.PeopleGlory to you, Lord Christ.

Some Pharisees came, and to test Jesus they asked, "Is it lawful for a man to divorce his wife?" He answered them, "What did Moses command you?" They said, "Moses allowed a man to write a certificate of dismissal and to divorce her." But Jesus said to them, "Because of your hardness of heart he wrote this commandment for you. But from the beginning of creation, 'God made them male and female.' 'For this reason a man shall leave his father and mother and be joined to his wife, and the two shall become one flesh.' So they are no longer two, but one flesh. Therefore what God has joined together, let no one separate."

Then in the house the disciples asked him again about this matter. He said to them, "Whoever divorces his wife and marries another commits adultery against her; and if she divorces her husband and marries another, she commits adultery."

People were bringing little children to him in order that he might touch them; and the disciples spoke sternly to them. But when Jesus saw this, he was indignant and said to them, "Let the little children come to me; do not stop them; for it is to such as these that the kingdom of God belongs. Truly I tell you, whoever does not receive the kingdom of God as a little child will never enter it." And he took them up in his arms, laid his hands on them, and blessed them.

THE SERMON

THE NICENE CREED

All stand.

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen. We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father. Through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation The Rev. Rob Keim

Our New Testament contains four Gospels or accounts of "good news" about Jesus and his teachings. Though Jesus and his disciples would have spoken Aramaic, these Gospels were originally written in Greek. Scholars have determined that the Gospels were written forty to sixty years after the death and resurrection of Jesus. Thus, there do not present an eyewitness or contemporary account of Jesus' life and teachings.

The Episcopal Church does not have a separate statement of faith or list of things we believe. Instead we hold the ancient **Creeds**, such as the Apostles' and Nicene, to be our statements of faith. They contain the core of our belief as Christians, but do not limit our faith.

he came down from heaven: by the power of the Holy Spirit he became incarnate from the Virgin Mary, and was made man. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end. We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son. With the Father and the Son he is worshiped and glorified. He has spoken through the Prophets. We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.

Lord of all wisdom and understanding, As water floods or runs dry so that seeds cannot grow and bear fruit, As the land can no longer flourish, As the temperature of our world rises, As ice melts and sea levels rise, We pray you to touch the hearts of those of us who have forsaken your creation For our own gain and false prosperity and for the complicity of all, That we may hear and respond to the groaning of the Earth's adversity. God of all creation, **Guide us in your love and grace.** Lord of all power and light, We pray you to enlighten those of us with power and wealth That we do not turn away in indifference but rather Come to use and share that power and wealth for the Common good, for the care of the poor, And for the care of all creation. God of all creation, **Guide us in your love and grace.**

Lord of all peoples, languages, and cultures, We thank you for giving us diversity in both nature and in humanity. We, at St. Barnabas remember the native peoples on whose homeland We now worship. We pray for forgiveness for any complicity in ill treatment of native peoples And seek to be united in ways that promote the well-being of all. God of all creation, **Guide us in your love and grace.**

Lord of healing and mercy,

We give thanks for your love and all that you give to us. We pray you now to care especially for people who suffer either From consequences of war, strife, famine, and ill health or for Any other reasons. We continue to pray for those in our own community: **Angie Maldonado & family, Shirley Holgate, Angela, Mary Ann, Rene Westerhuis, Stan Sharpe, Bobby S., and George Stewart. And we pray for those who have died. 



THE GREAT THANKSGIVING

In this season after Pentecost, we are using **Eucharistic Prayer 2** from the supplemental Episcopal resource, Enriching Our Worship. Note, the emphasis, in this version of the Eucharistic Prayer, on God as creator and on creation itself.

Today's choir anthem -Prayer of St. Francis composed by Sebastian Temple, was specially arranged for the funeral of Diana, Princess of Wales in Westminster Abbey, 6 September, 1997 by Martin Neary.

The Celebrant continues

We praise you and we bless you, holy and gracious God, source of life abundant. From before time you made ready the creation. Your Spirit moved over the deep and brought all things into being: sun, moon, and stars; earth, winds, and waters; and every living thing. You made us in your image, and taught us to walk in your ways. But we rebelled against you, and wandered far away; and yet, as a mother cares for her children, you would not forget us. Time and again you called us to live in the fullness of your love. And so this day we join with Saints and Angels in the chorus of praise that rings through eternity, lifting our voices to magnify you as we sing (say):


SANCTUS

The Celebrant continues

This anthem is known as the **Sanctus**. It is said or sung in almost every version of the Eucharistic Prayer. The word "sanctus" is Latin for "holy." God is holy and worthy of respect, awe, reverence, and devotion. Glory and honor and praise to you, holy and living God. To deliver us from the power of sin and death and to reveal the riches of your grace, you looked with favor upon Mary, your willing servant, that she might conceive and bear a son, Jesus the holy child of God. Living among us, Jesus loved us. He broke bread with outcasts and sinners, healed the sick, and proclaimed good news to the poor. He yearned to draw all the world to himself yet we were heedless of his call to walk in love. Then, the time came for him to complete upon the cross the sacrifice of his life, and to be glorified by you. On the night before he died for us, Jesus was at table with his friends. He took bread, gave thanks to you, broke it, and gave it to them, and said: "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

As supper was ending, Jesus took the cup of wine. Again, he gave thanks to you, gave it to them, and said: "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is poured out for you and for all for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Now gathered at your table, O God of all creation, and remembering Christ, crucified and risen, who was and is and is to come, we offer to you our gifts of bread and wine, and ourselves, a living sacrifice.

Pour out your Spirit upon these gifts that they may be the Body and Blood of Christ. Breathe your Spirit over the whole earth and make us your new creation, the Body of Christ given for the world you have made.

In the fullness of time bring us, with Barnabas and all your saints, from every tribe and language and people and nation, to feast at the banquet prepared from the foundation of the world. Through Christ and with Christ and in Christ, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, to you be honor, glory, and praise, for ever and ever. **Amen**. At this point in the Eucharistic Prayer the Celebrant makes the sign of the cross over the bread and wine and welcomes the infusion of the Spirit. The elements are now considered blessed or consecrated.

The Deacon says


As now as our Savior Christ has taught us, we are bold to say,

For all the times we have hurt or neglected animals, We are sorry.


For all the times we have destroyed the homes of animals in the forests, oceans, or fields, **We are sorry.**
