

## Welcome to Indoor Worship at St. Barnabas'!

Welcome to our in-person indoor worship service. In order to worship safely we will:

- Have doors and windows open to provide fresh airflow,

- Then you may take a small bowl of wine from the tray and consume the wine before returning to your seat. Empty bowls may be placed in the baskets along the side of the room.
- If you prefer, instead of an individual bowl, you may drink wine from the common chalice.
- If you are unable to come forward, let the ushers know so the bread can be brought to you.

Four courtyard and two narthex bathrooms are available for your use. Please use the disinfecting spray that is in the bathroom. If you have any questions or concerns, the Ushers are available to assist you.



For happiness I long have sought, And pleasure dearly I have bought: I missed of all: but now I see 'Tis found in Christ the apple tree.


I'm weary with my former toil, Here I will sit and rest awhile: Under the shadow I will be Of Jesus Christ the apple tree.

We bring many things with us into worship, and we ask the Holy Spirit to help us set those distractions aside, even briefly, so that we may focus on our worship of God.

# FIRST READING: Jeremiah 17:5-10

A Reading from the Prophet Jeremiah.

Thus says the Lord: Cursed are those who trust in mere mortal and make mere flesh their strength, whose hearts turn away from the Lord. They shall be like a shrub in the desert, and shall not see when relief comes. They shall live in the parched places of the wilderness, in an uninhabited salt land. Blessed are those who trust in the Lord, whose trust is the Lord. They shall be like a tree planted by water, sending out its roots by the stream. It shall not fear when heat comes, and its leaves shall stay green; in the year of drought it is not anxious, and it does not cease to bear fruit. The heart is devious above all else; it is perverse--who can understand it? I the Lord test the mind and search the heart, to give to all according to their ways, according to the fruit of their doings.

Each Sunday, our worship includes a reading from (a) the Old Testament, (b) the Psalms, (c) the New Testament, and (d) the Gospels.

Our readings are on a pre-set three-year cycle called "The Revised Common Lectionary" or RCL. We are currently in Year C of that three-year cycle.

We respond to the reading of Scripture by thanking God for the gift it is to us.


# SECOND READING: 1 Corinthians 15:12-20

A Reading from Paul's first letter to the Corinthians.

Now if Christ is proclaimed as raised from the dead, how can some of you say there is no resurrection of the dead? If there is no resurrection of the dead, then Christ has not been raised; and if Christ has not been raised, then our proclamation has been in vain and your faith has been in vain. We are even found to be misrepresenting God, because we testified of God that he raised Christ--whom he did not raise if it is true that the dead are not raised. For if the dead are not raised, then Christ has not been raised. If Christ has not been raised, your faith is futile and you are still in your sins. Then those also who have died in Christ have perished. If for this life only we have hoped in Christ, we are of all people most to be pitied.

But in fact Christ has been raised from the dead, the first fruits of those who have died.

# GOSPEL: Luke 6:17-26

All stand.DeaconThe Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke.PeopleGlory to you, Lord Christ.

Jesus came down with the twelve apostles and stood on a level place, with a great crowd of his disciples and a great multitude of people from all Judea, Jerusalem, and the coast of Tyre and Sidon. They had come to hear him and to be healed of their diseases; and those who were troubled with unclean spirits were cured. And all in the crowd were trying to touch him, for power came out from him and healed all of them.

Then he looked up at his disciples and said:

"Blessed are you who are poor,

for yours is the kingdom of God.

- "Blessed are you who are hungry now, for you will be filled.
- "Blessed are you who weep now, for you will laugh.

The **Sequence Hymn** leads us into and out of the Gospel reading.

This passage from the Gospel according to Luke is known as **"the** Sermon on the Plains" since it takes place on a "level place." A different version of these wisdom sayings is in the Gospel according to Matthew but that version is known as "the Sermon on the Mount" since the setting is up a mountain. "Blessed are you when people hate you, and when they exclude you, revile you, and defame you on account of the Son of Man. Rejoice in that day and leap for joy, for surely your reward is great in heaven; for that is what their ancestors did to the prophets."
"But woe to you who are rich, for you have received your consolation.
"Woe to you who are full now, for you will be hungry.
"Woe to you who are laughing now, for you will mourn and weep.
"Woe to you when all speak well of you, for that is what their ancestors did to the false prophets."

Today we welcome the Rev. Ken Kaisch back to our pulpit. Ken is a retired Episcopal Priest from LA, and he regularly attends our 8am worship service. Ken is also the author of a new book, **"Inside the Invisible."** 

The Episcopal Church does not have a separate statement of faith or list of things we believe. Instead we hold the ancient **Creeds**, such as the Apostles' and Nicene, to be our statements of faith. They contain the core of our belief as Christians, but do not limit our faith.

# THE NICENE CREED

All stand.

We believe in one God,
the Father, the Almighty,
maker of heaven and earth,
of all that is, seen and unseen.
We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ,
the only Son of God,
eternally begotten of the Father,
God from God, Light from Light,
true God from true God,
begotten, not made,
of one Being with the Father.
Through him all things were made.
For us and for our salvation
he came down from heaven:
by the power of the Holy Spirit
he became incarnate from the Virgin Mary,
and was made man.
For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate;
he suffered death and was buried.
On the third day he rose again
in accordance with the Scriptures;
he ascended into heaven
and is seated at the right hand of the Father.

He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end. We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son. With the Father and the Son he is worshiped and glorified. He has spoken through the Prophets. We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.

In February our concluding collect or prayer is in honor of Black History Month.

Absalom Jones (1746 -

1818) was an African-American abolitionist and clergyman who became prominent in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. Disappointed at the racial discrimination he experienced in a local Methodist church, he founded the Free African Society with Richard Allen in 1787, a mutual aid society for African Americans in the city. The Free African Society included many people *newly freed from slavery* after the American Revolutionary War. In 1794, Jones founded the first Black Episcopal congregation, and in *1802,[1] he was the first* African American to be ordained as a priest in the Episcopal Church of the United States.



In this season after Epiphany, we are using **Eucharistic Prayer C** from the Episcopal Book of Common Prayer.

With its emphasis on God as creator of the universe, some affectionately call this "the star trek" version of our Eucharist.

## The Celebrant continues

And so, Father, we who have been redeemed by him, and made a new people by water and the Spirit, now bring before you these gifts. Sanctify them by your Holy Spirit to be the Body and Blood of Jesus Christ our Lord.

On the night he was betrayed he took bread, said the blessing, broke the bread, and gave it to his friends, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper, he took the cup of wine, gave thanks, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Remembering now his work of redemption, and offering to you this sacrifice of thanksgiving,



The original version of this Eucharistic Prayer only listed the Patriarchs (men) from some of the early Old Testament stories. We know that God also honored the women of these stories, so we add them. You may note there are three men and four women. Remember that Leah and Rachel both had Jacob as a husband.

We alternate, by season, between the traditional version of the Lord's Prayer and the contemporary version of the Lord's Prayer. In this season of Epiphany, we are using the latter versions which was developed at a crossdenominational conference in in the 1970s.

# LIFE AT ST. BARNABAS

**HOW TO HELP THE WILDFIRE VICTIMS** – The Episcopal Diocese of Los Angeles has asked that anyone looking to make a direct donation to relief efforts in LA give to their annual appeal. They have announced, "Until further notice, all donations to the Annual Appeal will be used to help institutions and individuals most affected by the wildfires." Episcopal Relief and Development, who is working in partnership with the Diocese of Los Angeles, is accepting donations to their Wildfire Fund: <u>support.episcopalrelief.org/wildfire-2025</u>

While not all donations will go to LA, this fund is a critical resource for all Episcopal dioceses experiencing wildfires all over the world. With personnel trained in disaster response and recovery and grants and guidance given directly to churches, Episcopal Relief and Development will ensure that your donation is used according to the highest needs and best practices. You'll notice both of these are for monetary donations only. At this point, the Episcopal Diocese of Los Angeles has not sent out any requests for other kinds of aid.

You may also write a check out to St. Barnabas and put "Wildfire" or "ERD" into the memo line, and we will forward the donation to ERD. To date, we have gathered \$3,210 from you for the wildfire victims.

**EMBODIED SPIRITUAL PRACTICE** – Our bodies, or moving centers, are a vital category of spiritual practices. For many years, here at St. Barnabas, Sigrid Long has offered chair yoga, senior fitness, and yoga. Classes are donation based which is usually \$5-10.

Wednesdays at 12:15 pm – Chair Yoga / Senior Fitness Thursday at 9:30 am – Yoga Friday at 12:15 pm – Chair Yoga / Senior Fitness \*In February we are also offering additional Barre Sculpt classes.

**BARRE FITNESS CLASS** – Join Heidy for a FANTASTIC Barre Sculpt class every Monday and Friday at 10:30am in our St. Barnabas Church parish hall. Barre Sculpt is a mix of Pilates, Yoga, and functional weight and resistance training. This is a low-impact workout that works hard on our muscles, but is kind to our joints. The moves are choreographed and set to great, motivating music. Each energizing, targeted song sculpts, slims, and stretches your entire body. Local studios charge \$20 per class for these types of classes, but we are suggesting just a \$7 donation per class! Bring a mat, 2-3lb weights, a resistance band, and a small Pilates ball for an amazing full body workout. No dance experience required. You're gonna love it.

**STEPHEN MINISTRY** – Life transistors are hard. Some are much harder than others. It is those very difficult transitions in life that most call out for support: illness, job losses, grieving the passing of loved ones, are a few. No one should have to be alone at such times. Stephen Ministers serve to walk with others through their most difficult life journeys. We each commit to taking that walk with our care receivers. We are not counselors; we are Christian caregivers who are prepared to listen to your story, support you, and pray with you. Our leaders provide us with 50 hours of training in the skills we most need to help our care receivers navigate their crises. We are committed to strict confidentiality protecting others' thoughts and feelings.

Should you be experiencing one of life's very difficult transitions, talk with Deacon Susan Arnold to see if a Stephen Minister might provide the support you need.

# **OPPORTUNITIES TO GATHER VIRTUALLY**
