Welcome to our in-person indoor worship service. In order to worship safely we will:

- Have doors and windows open to provide fresh airflow,
- Be limited to those who have no COVID-19 symptoms and have not recently tested positive for COVID.

Distribution of bread and wine:

- Starting from the balcony and then the back of the room, Ushers will invite you forward to receive the bread and wine.
- Then you may take a small bowl of wine from the tray and consume the wine before returning to your seat. Empty bowls may be placed in the baskets along the side of the room.
- If you prefer, instead of an individual bowl, you may drink wine from the common chalice.
- If you are unable to come forward, let the ushers know so the bread can be brought to you.

Four courtyard and two narthex bathrooms are available for your use. Please use the disinfecting spray that is in the bathroom. If you have any questions or concerns, the Ushers are available to assist you.








COLLECT FOR PURITY

The Celebrant says

Almighty God, to you all hearts are open, all desires known, and from you no secrets are hid: Cleanse the thoughts of our hearts by the inspiration of your Holy Spirit, that we may perfectly love you, and worthily magnify your holy Name; through Christ our Lord. **Amen.**



The Collect for Purity is a prayer of preparation. We bring many things with us into worship, and we ask the Holy Spirit to help us set those distractions aside, even briefly, so that we may focus on our worship of God.

THE COLLECT OF THE DAY

People The Lord be with you.

And also with you.

Celebrant Let us pray.

O Lord, you have taught us that without love whatever we do is worth nothing: Send your Holy Spirit and pour into our hearts your greatest gift, which is love, the true bond of peace and of all virtue, without which whoever lives is accounted dead before you. Grant this for the sake of your only Son Jesus Christ, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. **Amen**.

Each Sunday, our worship includes a reading from (a) the Old Testament, (b) the Psalms, (c) the New Testament,

and (d) the Gospels.

THE LESSONS

FIRST READING: Genesis 45:3-11, 15

A Reading from the Book of Genesis.

Joseph said to his brothers, "I am Joseph. Is my father still alive?" But his brothers could not answer him, so dismayed were they at his presence.

Our readings are on a pre-set three-year cycle called "The Revised Common Lectionary" or RCL. We are currently in Year C of that three-year cycle.

Then Joseph said to his brothers, "Come closer to me." And they came closer. He said, "I am your brother, Joseph, whom you sold into Egypt. And now do not be distressed, or angry with yourselves, because you sold me here; for God sent me before you to preserve life. For the famine has been in the land these two years; and there are five more years in which there will be neither plowing nor harvest. God sent me before you to preserve for you a remnant on earth, and to keep alive for you many survivors. So it was not you who sent me here, but God; he has made me a father to Pharaoh, and lord of all his house and ruler over all the land of Egypt. Hurry and go up to my father and say to him, "Thus says your son Joseph, God has made me lord of all Egypt; come down to me, do not delay. You shall settle in the land of Goshen, and you shall be near me, you and your children and your children's children, as well as your flocks, your herds, and all that you have. I will provide for you there--since there are five more years of famine to come--so that you and your household, and all that you have, will not come to poverty."

And he kissed all his brothers and wept upon them; and after that his brothers talked with him.

We respond to the reading of Scripture by thanking God for the gift it is to us.

SECOND READING: 1 Corinthians 15:35-38,42-50

A Reading from Paul's first letter to the Corinthians.


Someone will ask, "How are the dead raised? With what kind of body do they come?" Fool! What you sow does not come to life unless it dies. And as for what you sow, you do not sow the body that is to be, but a bare seed, perhaps of wheat or of some other grain. But God gives it a body as he has chosen, and to each kind of seed its own body.

So, it is with the resurrection of the dead. What is sown is perishable, what is raised is imperishable. It is sown in dishonor; it is raised in glory. It is sown in weakness; it is raised in power. It is sown a physical body; it is raised a spiritual body. If there is a physical body, there is also a spiritual body. Thus, it is written, "The first man, Adam, became a living being"; the last Adam became a life-giving spirit. But it is not the spiritual that is first, but the physical, and then the spiritual. The first man was from the earth, a man of dust; the second man is from heaven. As was the man of dust, so are those who are of the dust; and as is the man of heaven, so are those who are of heaven. Just as we have borne the image of the man of dust, we will also bear the image of the man of heaven.

What I am saying, brothers and sisters, is this: flesh and blood cannot inherit the kingdom of God, nor does the perishable inherit the imperishable.

Jesus said, "I say to you that listen, Love your enemies, do good to those who hate you, bless those who curse you, pray for those who abuse you. If anyone strikes you on the cheek, offer the other also; and from anyone who takes away your coat do not withhold even your shirt. Give to everyone who begs from you; and if anyone takes away your goods, do not ask for them again. Do to others as you would have them do to you.

"If you love those who love you, what credit is that to you? For even sinners love those who love them. If you do good to those who do good to you, what credit is that to you? For even sinners do the same. If you lend to those from whom you hope to receive, what credit is that to you? Even sinners lend to sinners, to receive as much again. But love your enemies, do good, and lend, expecting nothing in return. Your reward will be great, and you will be children of the Most High; for he is kind to the ungrateful and the wicked. Be merciful, just as your Father is merciful.

"Do not judge, and you will not be judged; do not condemn, and you will not be condemned. Forgive, and you will be forgiven; give, and it will be given to you. A good measure, pressed down, shaken together, running over, will be put into your lap; for the measure you give will be the measure you get back."

This passage from the Gospel according to Luke is a continuation of last Sunday's Gospel reading which is known as "the Sermon on the Plains." Jesus continues to teach about wisdom and how to lead a healthy spiritual life.

The Episcopal Church does not have a separate statement of faith or list of things we believe. Instead we hold the ancient Creeds, such as the Apostles' and Nicene, to be our statements of faith. They contain the core of our belief as Christians, but do not limit our faith.

We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.



At 8:00 am the Sanctus is said by the Celebrant and People




The original version of this Eucharistic Prayer only listed the Patriarchs (men) from some of the early Old Testament stories. We know that God also honored the women of these stories, so we add them. You may note there are three men and four women. Remember that Leah and Rachel both had Jacob as a husband.

We alternate, by season, between the traditional version of the Lord's Prayer and the contemporary version of the Lord's Prayer. In this season of Epiphany, we are using the latter versions which was developed at a crossdenominational conference in in the 1970s.

In this season after Epiphany we are not shy about using the word "alleluia" for it shares our joy in the coming of the light of Christ into the world. However, in March, when we start the season of Lent, traditionally, we do not use the word. This is consistent with the more somber mood of Lent.





<u>CREATION CARE SUNDAY AT ST. BARNABAS</u> – Today, we welcome Don Maruska to our pulpit. Don is a parishioner at St. Benedict's Episcopal Church in Los Osos and is a Creation Care Evangelist.

Our St. Barnabas website has the follower statement about Creation Care. "We believe we are stewards of God's creation. As custodians of the Earth, we believe we have a duty to take action when research confirms our activities have had an unintended detrimental impact on the planet. It is our desire to leave our environment in a better place for future generations. We will strive to do this as a parish and as individuals."

During today's worship, Don will be sharing his and experience and joy in God's creation and how we might respond to this expression of God's love. After church, and during Coffee Hour, Don and several Cal Poly Climate Fellows will leading us a Climate Action Coffee Hour in which we will learn more about what we can all be doing to care for God's creation. The food for the Climate Action Coffee Hour is "green" and vegan.

<u>EMBODIED SPIRITUAL PRACTICE</u> – Our bodies, or moving centers, are a vital category of spiritual practices. For many years, here at St. Barnabas, Sigrid Long has offered chair yoga, senior fitness, and yoga. Classes are donation based which is usually \$5-10.

Wednesdays at 12:15 pm – Chair Yoga / Senior Fitness Thursday at 9:30 am – Yoga Friday at 12:15 pm – Chair Yoga / Senior Fitness *In February we are also offering additional Barre Sculpt classes.

BARRE FITNESS CLASS – Join Heidy for a FANTASTIC Barre Sculpt class every Monday and Friday at 10:30am in our St. Barnabas Church parish hall. Barre Sculpt is a mix of Pilates, Yoga, and functional weight and resistance training. This is a low-impact workout that works hard on our muscles, but is kind to our joints. The moves are choreographed and set to great, motivating music. Each energizing, targeted song sculpts, slims, and stretches your entire body. Local studios charge \$20 per class for these types of classes, but we are suggesting just a \$7 donation per class! Bring a mat, 2-3lb weights, a resistance band, and a small Pilates ball for an amazing full body workout. No dance experience required. You're gonna love it.

<u>STEPHEN MINISTRY</u> – Life transistors are hard. Some are much harder than others. It is those very difficult transitions in life that most call out for support: illness, job losses, grieving the passing of loved ones, are a few. No one should have to be alone at such times. Stephen Ministers serve to walk with others through their most difficult life journeys. We each commit to taking that walk with our care receivers. We are not counselors; we are Christian caregivers who are prepared to listen to your story, support you, and pray with you. Our leaders provide us with 50 hours of training in the skills we most need to help our care receivers navigate their crises. We are committed to strict confidentiality protecting others' thoughts and feelings.

Should you be experiencing one of life's very difficult transitions, talk with Deacon Susan Arnold to see if a Stephen Minister might provide the support you need.
