Welcome to Indoor Worship at St. Barnabas'!

Welcome to our in-person indoor worship service. In order to worship safely we will:

- Have doors and windows open to provide fresh airflow,
- Be limited to those who have no COVID-19 symptoms and have not recently tested positive for COVID.

Distribution of bread and wine:

- Then you may take a small bowl of wine from the tray and consume the wine before returning to your seat. Empty bowls may be placed in the baskets along the side of the room.
- If you prefer, instead of an individual bowl, you may drink wine from the common chalice.
- If you are unable to come forward, let the ushers know so the bread can be brought to you.

Four courtyard and two narthex bathrooms are available for your use. Please use the disinfecting spray that is in the bathroom. If you have any questions or concerns, the Ushers are available to assist you.

THE LESSONS

FIRST READING: Acts 2:1-21

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles.

When the day of Pentecost had come, they were all together in one place. And suddenly from heaven there came a sound like the rush of a violent wind, and it filled the entire house where they were sitting. Divided tongues, as of fire, appeared among them, and a tongue rested on each of them. All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages, as the Spirit gave them ability.

Now there were devout Jews from every nation under heaven living in Jerusalem. And at this sound the crowd gathered and was bewildered, because each one heard them speaking in the native language of each. Amazed and astonished, they asked, "Are not all these who are speaking Galileans? And how is it that we hear, each of us, in our own native language? Parthians, Medes, Elamites, and residents of Mesopotamia, Judea and Cappadocia, Pontus and Asia, Phrygia and Pamphylia, Egypt and the parts of Libya belonging to Cyrene, and visitors from Rome, both Jews and proselytes, Cretans and Arabs—in our own languages we hear them speaking about God's deeds of power." All were amazed and perplexed, saying to one another, "What does this mean?" But others sneered and said, "They are filled with new wine."

But Peter, standing with the eleven, raised his voice and addressed them, "Men of Judea and all who live in Jerusalem, let this be known to you, and listen to what I say. Indeed, these are not drunk, as you suppose, for it is only nine o'clock in the morning. No, this is what was spoken through the prophet Joel:

In the last days it will be, God declares,
that I will pour out my Spirit upon all flesh,
and your sons and your daughters shall prophesy,
and your young men shall see visions,



It is traditional for the people to stand as the **Gospel Book** is lifted high by the Deacon.

As the Gospel is announced, some people use their thumb to make **the sign of the cross** on their forehead, mouth, and heart. These three locations indicate that the Gospel reading is to enter the mind, voice, and heart. Some people also bow as a sign of reverence for Jesus who is depicted in the Gospels.

It is customary for us to say the **Nicene Creed** any time we have a Eucharist. The Creed is structured in the threefold way of the Trinity – Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.

he became incarnate from the Virgin Mary, and was made man. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end. We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son. With the Father and the Son he is worshiped and glorified. He has spoken through the Prophets. We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.

For our President, for the leaders of the nations, and for all in authority, let us pray to the Lord. Lord, have mercy.

For this city, Arroyo Grande, for every city and community, and for those who live in them, let us pray to the Lord. Lord, have mercy.

For those in Ukraine who are in the midst of war and for those who have fled the terrors, let us pray to the Lord. **Lord, have mercy.**

For the good earth which God has given us, and for the wisdom and will to conserve it, let us pray to the Lord. Lord, have mercy.

For the diverse and vibrant native communities who make their home here and across these lands. For all Native Peoples on whose ancestral homelands we are worshipping this morning, let us pray to the Lord. **Lord, have mercy.**

For the aged and infirm, for the widowed and orphans, and for the sick and the suffering, let us pray to the Lord. Lord, have mercy.

Within our own community we continue to pray for: David Kulinski, Laura Talon, Bodie Smith, Beatriz Talay, Rocyn's children and husband, Allyson Hebrard, Craig Martin, Caley, Hannah Renew, Jose, Sheri, Nicole, and Rob Keim.

Let us pray to the Lord. Lord, have mercy.

For all who have died in the hope of the resurrection, and especially for: Tim Banducci, Loretta Suit, Gerry Connolly, Ed Smiley, Monroe Milstein, and Uche Ojeh. Lord, have mercy.

For deliverance from all danger, violence, oppression, and degradation, let us pray to the Lord. Lord, have mercy.

That we may end our lives in faith and hope, without suffering and without reproach, let us pray to the Lord. Lord, have mercy.

(The Intercessor then reads the petitions from the bidding.) And after a moment of silence, the Deacon adds a concluding Collect.



THE GREAT THANKSGIVING

The People remain standing.



The Celebrant continues

It is right, and a good and joyful thing, always and everywhere to give thanks to you, Almighty God, Creator of heaven and earth.

But chiefly are we bound to praise you for the glorious resurrection of your Son Jesus Christ our Lord; for he is the true Paschal Lamb, who was sacrificed for us, and has taken away the sin of the world. By his death he has destroyed death, and by his rising to life again he has won for us everlasting life.

Therefore we praise you, joining our voices with Angels and Archangels and with all the company of heaven, who for ever sing this hymn to proclaim the glory of your Name:

This is **Eucharistic Prayer B** from our Episcopal Book of Common Prayer. It is probably the form of the Eucharistic Prayer that is done the most frequently, thus it may be the most familiar.

SANCTUS

This point of the Eucharistic Prayer is known as the Epiclesus. It is the invocation or calling down from on high by which the Priest invokes the Holy Spirit on the Eucharistic bread and wine. + "Sanctify us also..." At these words some make the sign of the cross as symbol of our sanctification and blessing by the food drink, and by extension the acts of Jesus.



We give thanks to you, O God, for the goodness and love which you have made known to us in creation; in the calling of Israel to be your people; in your Word spoken through the prophets; and above all in the Word made flesh, Jesus, your Son. For in these last uays you sent him to be incarnate from the Virgin Mary, to be the Savior and Redeemer of the world. In him, you have delivered us from evil, and made us worthy to stand before you. In him, you have brought us out of error into truth, out of sin into righteousness, out of death into life.

On the night before he died for us, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me." Therefore, according to his command, O Father,

And we offer our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving to you, O Lord of all; presenting to you, from your creation, this bread and this wine.

We pray you, gracious God, to send your Holy Spirit upon these gifts that they may be the Sacrament of the Body of Christ and his Blood of the new Covenant. Unite us to your Son in his sacrifice, that we may be acceptable through him, being sanctified by the Holy Spirit.

In the fullness of time, put all things in subjection under your Christ, and bring us to that heavenly country where, with Barnabas and all your saints, we may enter the everlasting heritage of your sons and daughters; through Jesus Christ our Lord, the firstborn of all creation, the head of the Church, and the author of our salvation.

By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty Father, now and for ever. Amen.



LIFE AT ST. BARNABAS

PRIDE CELEBRATION – As Pride Month begins, I give thanks for this opportunity to join with Episcopalians across our church in celebrating the beauty, strength, and sacred worth of the LGBTQ+ community. As we prepare to spend June honoring the lives, gifts, and witness of LGBTQ+ people in our church and beyond, I want to express my gratitude to all of you, LGBTQ+ Episcopalians and allies, who will share God's abundant love at Pride events in your community. While the journey is not yet over, Pride gives us an opportunity to remember the struggles, celebrate the joy, and give thanks for the love of God that binds us together and makes us one. NEW BIBLE STUDY CLASS – Our Tuesday morning Bible Study class has shifted to a new study book. We are now studying *The Social Justice Bible Challenge*. This study book bridges the gap between knowing the Bible and living it. For those who are invested in the work of social justice, each of the forty meditations connect their compassion to God's word. For those who are deeply engaged in scripture, the readings, questions, and prayers of the study book command action. Featuring forty reflections by spiritual leaders and writers from around the world, *The Social Justice Bible Challenge* is an extension of The Bible Challenge, a global initiative to encourage engagement with scripture and an exploration of the word of God. Please join us, on Zoom or in person, as we go deeper in our spiritual journey with God.

<u>THE SPIRITUALITY OF AGING</u> – In monthly gatherings we will look at how to "grow" old, rather than just "get" old, by exploring the wisdom of a lifetime and embracing the changes aging brings. Age has a different task than youth, or mature adulthood. The task is to reflect on the meaning of life and to prepare for the final surrender of all we are and have been to our Creator and guide. We move from "doing" to "being", and from "role" to "soul". Age may bring not only the challenge of losses and change but also appreciation of all God has made and done in us. It can open out into the vocation of "elderhood", or sharing our gentle, patient wisdom with family, friends, and situations. We do not have less to look forward to, but more. We may miss our ability to control the outcomes of our health, life, and relationships, but we are invited to a new vision of God as our faithful companion. We can learn to find God everywhere, not just in special places, rituals, or times. And little by little the trust this builds in us opens into a joyous, grateful experience of the present moment which will become an eternity of love. This group meets on the second Tuesday of each month and next meets on <u>Tuesday, June 10th at 3:00 pm</u>. This class will be held in the worship space and will not be online.
